Green Guide for Health Care™: Versions and Vision, Tools and Transition

Welcome to the first bi-monthly edition of our newsletter of 2009, designed to keep you updated about the new and current versions of the *Green Guide for Health Care* (GGHC), our shared vision moving forward, the tools we are developing, and the transition necessary to accomplish our goals of advancing the greening of healthcare.

The *Green Guide for Health Care*, a project of Health Care Without Harm (HCWH) and the Center for Maximum Potential Building Systems, is the first voluntary, best practices green building toolkit customized for the health care sector, using the U.S. Green Building Council's LEED® credit framework, with permission. To date, the *Green Guide* has attracted more than 25,000 website registrants, and 189 registered projects. The *Green Guide's* international reach has expanded to 113 countries and includes every state and province in the US and Canada.

The *Green Guide for Health Care* closed out 2008 with the release of the substantially revised Version 2.2 Operations section. Implementation of this tool is coordinated with our strategic partner Practice Greenhealth (www.practicegreenhealth.org). A pilot project for participating hospitals is being planned for 2009. Details to follow.

Concurrent with v2.2 Operations revisions, the GGHC Steering Committee conducted a strategic visioning process for the next generation version of GGHC, grounded by an aspirational vision of a "regenerative, restorative, and resilient (R3) hospital." The first phase of this process was completed in February 2009. We now are transitioning into a post-visioning phase that will take the conceptual elements of an "aspirational hospital" and move them towards the development of a decision-making continuous improvement tool.

Elements of the *Green Guide's* team transition in 2009 included the departure of Adele Houghton, GGHC Coordinator, and the arrival of Kumkum M. Dilwali, Senior Director. We all are thankful to Adele for her efforts and accomplishments at GGHC, and we welcome Kumkum into this newly defined role. GGHC will continue to work collaboratively and cooperatively as the developer of innovative tools for market transformation, in alliance with our sister organizations: Practice Greenhealth, Health Care Without Harm, and the Global Health and Safety Initiative.

In the spirit of continuous improvement, the GGHC website is scheduled for redesign this year. Providing ease of access to resources, compiling metrics, and sharing best practices will be our priority. We welcome your constructive comments at info@gghc.org.
